

Genesis 2:21-25

Matthew 19:8-12

⁸ He said to them, "Because of your hardness of heart Moses allowed you to divorce your wives, but from the beginning it was not so.
⁹ And I say to you: whoever divorces his wife, except for sexual immorality, and marries another, commits adultery."

- Jesus has a very high view of marriage.
- Jesus acknowledges the profound, painful and disruptive nature of breaking the covenantal trust that is inherent in marriage.
- Jesus reveals the destructiveness that multiplies and magnifies with adultery when it people do not dealt with it and they are unrepentant.

Matthew 19:10-12

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¹⁰ The disciples said to Him,

"If such is the case of a man with his wife, it is better not to marry."

¹¹ But He said to them,

"Not everyone can receive this saying, but only those to whom it is given.

¹² For there are eunuchs who have been so from birth, and there are eunuchs who have been made eunuchs by men, and there are eunuchs who have made themselves eunuchs for the sake of the kingdom of heaven.

Let the one who is able to receive this receive it."

Were any of Jesus inner circle of disciples married?

- Simon Peter (Cephas)
- Clement of Alexandria (150 AD 215 AD) mentions both Simon Peter and Phillip as married.
- I Corinthians 9

³ This is my defense to those who would examine me. ⁴ Do we not have the right to eat and drink? ⁵ Do we not have the right to take along a believing wife, as do the other apostles and the brothers of the Lord and Cephas?

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Greek: eunouchos

Definition: a eunuch

Usage: a chamberlain, keeper of the bed-chamber of an eastern royal household castrated person, or one who voluntarily abstains from sexual activity

- Properly, "alone in bed" (i.e. without a marriage partner) -
- Literally: a *castrated* (emasculated) man;
- Figuratively: someone who *abstains from marriage* (sexual relations) to be *solely devoted to God*, refers to someone who voluntarily chooses a life of *sexual abstinence*.

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Those who either cannot or should not be sexually active; or who volitionally choose celibacy for a cause.

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I Corinthians 7:25-40

²⁵ Now concerning the betrothed, I have no command from the Lord, but I give my judgment as one who by the Lord's mercy is trustworthy.

- ²⁶ I think that in view of the present distress it is good for a person to remain as he is.
- Are you bound to a wife? Do not seek to be free. Are you free from a wife? Do not seek a wife.
- ²⁸ But if you do marry, you have not sinned, and if a betrothed woman marries, she has not sinned. Yet those who marry will have worldly troubles, and I would spare you that.
- This is what I mean, brothers: the appointed time has grown very short.
 From now on, let those who have wives live as though they had none,
 and those who mourn as though they were not mourning, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no goods,



"You are lucky to have a good husband (or wife)...." No!!!!!!

It isn't luck.

There is nothing lucky abut our marriage.

I think we need to stop painting the picture of a happy marriage that doesn't come through hard work.

Any couple who has a healthy, happy marriage that has lasted 10, 20, 30 or even 50 years didn't get there by luck.

They didn't just stay happily married.

They sacrificed.

They forgave.

They rebuilt trust that was broken.

They apologized.

They kept dating.

They got help when they were stuck.

They made time for each other.

They learned how to communicate.

They cared more about the marriage than their pride.

There was nothing lucky about the marriage.

They worked.

They worked hard for one another.

The truth is- there is no happily ever after without the blood, the sweat, and the tears.

The truth is that you can't get to happy with going the hard way.

Your marriage is worth working for.



³¹ and those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the present form of this world is passing away.

- ³² I want you to be free from anxieties.
 - The unmarried man is anxious about the things of the Lord, how to please the Lord.
- ³³ But the married man is anxious about worldly things, how to please his wife, ³⁴ and his interests are divided.
 - And the unmarried or betrothed woman is anxious about the things of the Lord, how to be holy in body and spirit. But the married woman is anxious about worldly things, how to please her husband.
- ³⁵ I say this for your own benefit, not to lay any restraint upon you,
 - but to promote good order and to secure your undivided devotion to the Lord.

³⁶ If anyone thinks that he is not behaving properly toward his betrothed, if his passions are strong, and it has to be, let him do as he wishes: let them marry—it is no sin.

³⁷ But whoever is firmly established in his heart, being under no necessity but having his desire under control, and has determined this in his heart, to keep her as his betrothed, he will do well.

³⁸ So then he who marries his betrothed does well, and he who refrains from marriage will do even better.
³⁹ A wife is bound to her husband as long as he lives. But if her husband dies, she is free to be married to whom she wishes, only in the Lord.
⁴⁰ Yet in my judgment she is happier if she remains as she is. And I think that I too have the Spirit of God.
