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The big idea for last week?



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The 'resurrection' of Christ was the model and first example of what is going to happen to us eventually and explained not only historically but also logically, theologically, and experientially.



In Greek thought, the concept of physical resurrection was generally foreign and not a desired or expected outcome of death. While the Greeks believed in immortality, particularly through the continued existence of the soul, they didn't envision a return to a physical earthly body because it would disturb the natural order.

They clearly did not understand that death had already disturbed the natural order and that resurrection is what would put it back into what was intended from the very beginning at creation.



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The big idea for this week?

The 'resurrection' not only determines and describes our future, but it determines and describes our today.

I Corinthians 15:35-58

35 But someone will ask,

"How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?"

You foolish person! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies.

And what you sow is not the body that is to be, but a bare kernel, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain.

But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

For not all flesh is the same, but there is one kind for humans, another for animals, another for birds, and another for fish.

There are heavenly bodies and earthly bodies, but the glory of the heavenly is of one kind, and the glory of the earthly is of another.

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
Greek: apothnéskó


Meaning: to die off (literally or figuratively); lie a-dying


Focuses on the separation that goes with the "dying off (away from)."

Occurs 111 times in the NT. It stresses the significance of the separation that always comes with divine closure.

Stresses the ending of what is "former" – to bring what (naturally) follows.







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
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
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
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




Meaning: immovable, unmovable, without movement or change of status, to be "rooted".






Meaning: To be in excess, to excel, to go above and beyond; to be completely accomplished as to purpose, to "blossom".







Greek: kopos

labor + trouble= weariness

– to strike a blow that is so hard that it seriously weakens or debilitates that causes deep fatigue and extreme weariness.
