Greek: kakopatheo

- to be treated maliciously;
- a painful hardship that seems to be "a setback" but actually isn't
- to endure affliction

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Greek: euthumeo

- to show positive passion that proceeds from a sound disposition
- to be of good cheer and high morale

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Greek: astheneo

- to be ill
- to be without strength
- to languish
- to be weak...(physically and then morally)...to be sick

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Greek: aleipho

- to anoint out of honor and consecration.
- Olive oil applied to the body to supply a penetrating spiritual comfort to impart strength and healing.

Should Christians use anointing oil today?

There is nothing in Scripture that commands or even suggests that we should use similar oil today, but neither is there anything to forbid it.

Oil is often used as a symbol for the Holy Spirit in the Bible as in the parable of the wise and foolish virgins (Matthew 25:1-13).

Christians have the Spirit who leads us into all truth and "anoints" us continually with His grace and comfort.

"But you have an anointing from the Holy One, and all of you know the truth"

(I John 2:20).
